# TEA AT THE EMPRESS EDEANA MALCOLM

In the 1920s, suffragist Edith fights to climb the ladder at Victoria's *Daily Colonist*, while trying to live the life of a free, modern woman in a society that isn't quite ready for it.

In the 1910s, Edith sees the love of her life head off to fight a far-away war, while she struggles to find her way around Victorian attitudes, especially her mother's.

Trying to build her future, Edith suddenly finds herself face-to-face with her past as long-hidden family secrets make their way out into the open.

In alternating timelines, *Tea at the Empress* examines an era when the personal was undeniably political for women, in general and individually, as they worked to figure out how to bring a new and better world to life.

Tea at the Empress is a delight. The character of Edith positively sparkles on the page — a young woman living a life of excitement at a time when women were only beginning to access hard-won human rights. While Edith's story provides plenty of humour, nostalgia and entertainment, it also serves as an important call to action for this and future generations.

## House of Crows

#### EDEANA MALCOLM

THREE GENERATIONS OF WOMEN struggle and toil to better their lot in life, from 1852 and the early European settlement in Victoria to 1898 and its growth as a burgeoning city.


In her maid's uniform, looking at her mother and grandmother in their widow's weeds, Maggie dubs their shared home 'the House of Crows'. In the 1890s, she works as a sixteen-year-old maid at elegant Point Ellice House. Though she desires so much more for herself, the conditions of her life — not only being female, but also living in poverty in an all-female household — limit her expectations to finding a husband.

In 1853, her grandmother Edie arrives from Scotland as a young woman with her children and her husband, who is to be employed as an indentured farm servant. Her dreams for a better life are curtailed when her husband begins to drink too much and work too little. Ever-practical, she does the work of feeding the family in the harsh conditions faced by early settlers.

Lucy, Edie's daughter and Maggie's mother, is a dreamer who manages to live her dreams in spite of the hardships of her life. A seamstress who loves her work, she provides most of the income for her family, but her story holds a tragic secret. Her husband, the love of her life and Maggie's father, died due to her negligence.

Told in interwoven chapters and timelines following each woman's journey through life in 1800s Victoria, *House of Crows* juxtaposes the harsh realities faced by the women who helped build Victoria with the immigrant's dream for a new start and the promise of unbounded opportunity that lured many of our ancestors across the oceans, if not for themselves, then for their children.

House of Crows serves as a prequel of sorts to Tea at the Empress, featuring three generations of women prior.





## KYLE HAWKE



Brad Yung admits he's screwed up, but he wants better for his kids and he's willing to go to extremes to do it. Each story culminates in a lesson that messed him up, so he's not going to teach them to his kids until it's too late.








When the emperor wore Plaid and people still hung phones on walls, Brad Yung's weekly comic strip *Stay as you are.* was a beacon to the slacker generation that bathed in irony and rejected everything else.

A true underground underdog, the strip appeared in magazines including Geist, Adbusters, Comic Relief, and Ricepaper, newspapers including WestEnder, Columbia Journal, Sea-To-Sky Voice, and Carbondale Times; and too many underground zines to mention. Too savage, too biting, its targets too spread out and numerous, the strip knew it was never going to achieve mainstream success and didn't care.

The Complete Stay as you are. honours these remnants of a simpler, yet more complicated time. A review once called Yung the world's first meta-ironist — if that's true, he should probably apologize. But he won't.







## RILEY AND THE GREAT WAR JAMES ANDERSON O'NEAL

MISSOURI BOYS Riley, a taciturn farm boy with a talent for fighting and an irresistible yen for adventure, and Cornelius, a smart fast-talker with a penchant for finding trouble (especially with women), see their fortunes rise and fall with the turns and twists of the Twentieth Century — or at least, that's what they'd have us believe.

Running off to Mexico at age eighteen, the boys join the Punitive Expedition against Pancho Villa, falling under the wing of George Patton. Riley falls for Marta, the beautiful daughter of a Mexican rancher, but things turn suddenly as a mysterious Spaniard comes into the picture. Villa imprisons the group, while the Spaniard seems to have his own darker agenda underneath it all.

Later, Riley and Marta marry, but a sedate life in Missouri isn't enough for the boys. They enlist to fight in the Great War, soon finding themselves in the thick of the Battle of Cantigny, the first American offensive in the war. Patton reappears, tasking them to help defend "the most important man in France" from a German plot — but is that man French Prime Minister Georges Clemenceau, visiting British dignitary Winston Churchill, or someone else?


Cornelius is taken captive while Riley returns to the army only to be mustard-gassed and hospitalized. While Riley recovers, Cornelius agrees to spy on Communist firebrand Rosa Luxemburg to gain his freedom. Eventually, the boys reunite in the struggle for Germany between the Communists and the Freikorps, the fascists who would later become the core of the Nazi party.

Bent on revenge, the boys trail Cornelius' captor to a fascist beer hall, where everything comes down to a fixed boxing match refereed by a bitter young fascist with a Charlie Chaplin mustache.

Bringing it all full-circle, a postscript to the novel finds ninety-yearold Riley and Cornelius watching the fall of the Berlin Wall. The Twentieth Century belongs to Riley and Cornelius — or so they'll tell you.




